Ladner Carol Ships by Ken Robertson

The last event of 2024 for the CLI lifeboats was to join the annual parade of Ladner Carol Ships along the Ladner waterfront. On December 6th and 7th, the Fraser and Delta lifeboats participated in the parade, primarily as safety vessels. It also allows us to raise our profile in the community, “showing the flag”. Along with all the other boats, the Fraser and Delta vessels were decorated in bright coloured lights and primed to have visitors aboard. As in the past, the parade was to gather at Wellington Point, which is at the west end of Ladner, and would then proceed at slow speed east along Ladner Slough, close to the float homes.

to the CLI calendar, the Fraser Lifeboat was to have mustered aboard at 6.00pm as they had further to travel. The Delta Lifeboat calendar showed that the crew were to muster at 6.30. However, this did not allow any flexibility in the time required to travel to Wellington Point, which normally takes about 25 - 30 minutes. When 6.30 rolled around, and some of the signed-up crew had not arrived, we started to prepare to cast off and go without them. At 6.35 we could not wait any longer. The command was given to “Let go 1, 3 & 4”. Those lines were cast off, hung on the “trees” and just as we started to spring ahead on #2, two missing crew were seen running down the ramp and on to the dock. As there was little wind we were able to remain stationary while they scrambled aboard. That was the only excitement of the evening.

We proceeded along the slough to Wellington Point, and mingled with the other vessels, as they started to form up behind the lead vessel. The weather was overcast, but calm. We were the last in the convoy, until Fraser arrived and then they became “tail-end-Charlie”. Shouts and greetings were exchanged with the people gathered on the decorated houseboats and float homes as the parade proceeded along the slough. Delta turned in when we reached the Ladner government floats, tying up in our normal spot. Fraser continued up the slough to Sharkey’s Pub, before turning and tying up behind Delta. RCM-SAR7 were invited to join us aboard Delta for a hot drink and cookies, which they accepted after rafting to Fraser. They were with us for about half an hour. They were also asked to pass on the invitation to the Saturday crew, which they said that they would. We had about 20 crew and guests aboard that evening, enjoying the camaraderie, as well as the food and drinks supplied by the crew.

On Saturday evening we were able to get away on time, so took a side trip around Gillian’s Island, arriving at Wellington Point in time to join the flotilla. Fraser arrived at the same time, and accepted our suggestion that they precede us in the parade, making Delta the “tail-end-Charlie”. There were many people greeting us as we slowly made our way eastwards. Fraser

followed us to the dock and once again we had a full complement in the wardroom, where everyone savoured the company and the goodies. Unfortunately, RCM-SAR did not join us. They missed out on enjoying the hearty beef stew that John More provided. He also managed the galley in his normal efficient manner, making sure that everybody was well looked after. It was a nice end of the 2024 CLI calendar. We can now look forward to more good times in 2025 aboard Fraser and Delta lifeboats.

Tuesday June 10th. In a recent general information meeting among its volunteers, the CLI Board rolled out its newly revised volunteer organizational structure. The most notable change was the addition of a fourth functional group to be known as the





“Community Outreach Team”. This group was added to consolidate the talent and abilities of the many volunteers in our ranks interested in public communications and relations. This new team will aim at broadening community awareness of CLI’s efforts and contributions toward maritime safety for pleasure boaters and the commercial fishing sector. The group will also advance a more structured and focused approach to fund raising and toward stepping up new recruitment numbers.

The other three - pre-existing - functional groups include: Engineering and Maintenance; Lifeboat Operations and Crew Training, and First Aid Co-ordination and Training.

In conjunction with this functional restructuring of its volunteer organization, the CLI Board is also moving forward with adjustments to its fiscal and general financial management. These are planned specifically in response to anticipated changes in economic conditions and industry activities on the Fraser River.



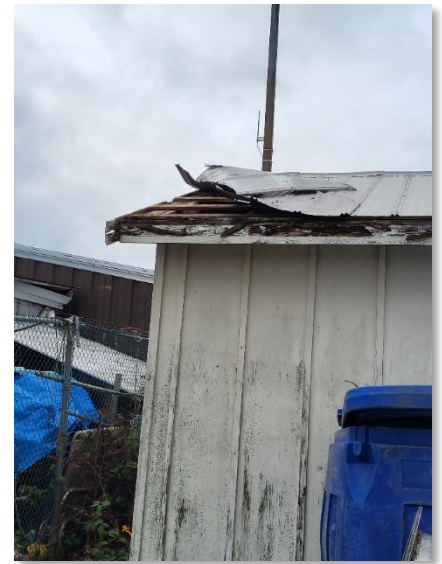
New storage location lifejackets Fraser lifeboat

To keep the new expensive SAR life vests in pristine condition the vests have been moved from the aft cabin to the forward cabin. During the winter months this cabin is heated. New heavy-duty coat hangers will prevent the vests from slipping of the hanger and falling on the deck. Each coat hanger has a vest size label to make it easier to pick the right size vest. Make sure to put it back on the right hanger.

Another advantage of this move is that the aft cabin with all the cabinets and gear is now more accessible. In the coming weeks it will be further cleaned to make it even more workable.

CLI shed Steveston harbour roof damage

During the December storms part of the roof has been blown off resulting in water ingress in the shed. PJ and Nick did some emergency repairs but because the shed is used for storage like the boat show gear a more permanent solution will be needed. The shed is falling apart, rats are roaming through the shed damaging floater jackets and other gear. Replacement of this shed is eminent.

On the 14th of December Carla Qualtrough, our MP for Delta South, presented 30 very worthy Delta residents with the King Charles III coronation medals on behalf of the governor General. Each person had a fantastic story to tell of community service.

Long time CLI supporter, Elizabeth Murray and senior CLI cox'n John Horton both received medals. Elizabeth for her work and support of the Canadian Scottish Society and the Anglican Diocese of New Westminster, and John for his recording, through his art, of Canada's rich marine history, his work as a war artist, and long contribution to search and rescue.

In February 2024, John also received the British Nuclear medal in recognition of his involvement in the UK's nuclear programme in the 1950s!



Community leaders honoured with King Charles III Coronation Medals

Delta MP Carla Qualtrough honoured members of the Delta community with the King Charles III Coronation Medal during a ceremony at Ladner's Harris Barn on Saturday, Dec. 14.

In May 2023, to mark the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III, the prime minister announced the government's intention to award Coronation Medals to Canadians who exemplify service, generosity, and leadership. The medals highlight outstanding individuals from all walks of life who inspire and strengthen their communities through their dedication and achievements.
